Christmas Light Show Music Selections

1. Opening fanfare during John Facenda's/Julie Andrews' introduction:
Provenance unknown.
2. Selections from Tchaikovsky's Nutcracker Suite-specifically "Overture," "Waltz of the Flowers," and "Closing Waltz," played during the Nutcracker storyline. Album unknown.
3. "In The Clock Store" by Charles Orth (1893), which is played during the Clock segment. The version used in the Light Show comes from an album titled "The Sound Of Musical Pictures" (1960). It was arranged by Ralph Hermann and played by the Medallion Concert Band. Walt Disney adapted the piece for one of his Silly Symphonies in 1931.
4. "Alpine Sleigh Ride" by Frank Chacksfield and his Orchestra, played during the Snowflake sequence.
5. "Rudolph the Red Nose Reindeer," by the Ray Conniff Singers.
6. "Jingle Bell Rock" by Bobby Helms, later replaced by "The Rudi Bear Song" (part of a Teddy Bear promotion), played during the candy cane, toy soldier and toy drum segment.
7. "Parade of the Wooden Soldiers" from the 1959 RCA Victor album "Christmas Surprises by the Ralph Hunter Choir."
8. "Frosty the Snowman," by the Ray Conniff Singers.
9. A snippet of "So Long, Farewell" from "The Sound of Music" movie soundtrack, played during the fading of the snowmen.
10. "O Tannenbaum" by the Hollywood Bowl Symphony Orchestra, played during the final lighting of the entire board. This was replaced in 1988 by "Deck the Halls" from the Capitol LP "The Music of Christmas" featuring Carmen Dragon and the Hollywood Bowl Symphony Orchestra. Dragon's arrangement has been adapted for the Wanamaker Organ (with grateful assistance from Mr. Dragon's daughter Kathy) by Peter Richard Conte.
